HEADMASTER'S PRIZE-GIVING SPEECH

The Chinese bamboo tree is a very interesting plant.

According to legend, the Chinese bamboo tree takes five years to grow.

After being planted, it is watered and fertilized for a year, but nothing happens.

During the second year, it is watered and fertilized again, with no result.

This happens in the third and fourth years too, and the result... nothing.

However, sometime during the fifth year, something unbelievable happens. The plant explodes out of the earth and grows to about 30m high in just 6 weeks.

The reflective question is:

Did this growth happen in 5 years, or just 6 weeks?

The answer is:

Five years of careful preparation and hard work, and a fifth year when all the patient caring pays off and leads to success.

A possible lesson in the Chinese bamboo tree story, is that it teaches us the importance of values such as patience, persistence, and faith, AND, by extension... that every one of us sitting here tonight has potential.

Just as the Chinese bamboo develops strong roots to survive, if we keep working hard, and make the effort to build a solid foundation, we must be able to find a way to achieve success.

The broad theme (and by association, the focus) of my speech tonight, revolves around the notion of taking time to PAUSE... REFLECT... and APPRECIATE one's achievements in life at any given moment in time.

Take a moment to be proud... and then use that particular moment of success to move on and achieve something even greater!

Linking the Chinese bamboo tree story to school

In the same way that it takes 5 years for somebody to grow a Chinese bamboo tree, it takes educators 13 years, from Grade R to Grade 12, to prepare pupils to become successful adults.

Pupils, in turn, need to work diligently and responsibly - and make the most of every opportunity during this time - to ensure that they graduate successfully into the adult world after Grade 12.

The roles of the teachers in all phases of this educational journey are immense. While the focus tonight is on the achievements of our pupils in the High School, it is appropriate to pause and acknowledge that without the foundation laid and then consolidated through the course of Grades RRRR to Grade 7, achievements in High School, simply put, are not possible.

I therefore take this opportunity to acknowledge:

- Mrs Poustie and our ECD teachers at Roots
- Mrs Schnell and our Foundation Phase teachers
- Mrs Wickham and our Senior Primary teachers

I also think it is appropriate to acknowledge the group of pupils and parents who have been at Felixton College from Roots through to Grade 12.

Parents, whether it is your first journey

through the school... or your only journey... or your third, you are very much a part of the DNA of the school.

Grade 12s, you clearly have a major head start in life, as you have had access to the best educators throughout your entire school experience.

I now draw your attention to noteworthy in-house achievements, specifically with regard to Academics, Sport, and Culture.

Academics (Head of Academics: Miss Reddy)

Based on the performances of our Grade 12s in the end of year IEB NSC examinations over the last 5 years, we have moved into a space now where we get to talk about a Grade 12 cohort achieving 100% tertiary access.

We are also able to refer to our top performing Grade 12 pupils who feature in the full house of distinctions category, get acknowledged in the Top 1% in some of their subjects (nationally), and get placed on IEB Outstanding and Commendable Achievers lists.

General school academic achievements are of a high standard (which will become evident tonight through the awards that are handed out), and we are particularly proud of the top performing pupils in each of the Grades 8 through 12 (with regard to overall averages and number of distinctions obtained over the year).

Sport (Head of Sport: Mr Picton)

There are 226 pupils in the High School. Of these pupils, 64 represented various teams at district level this year (uThungulu, King Cetshwayo, and Zululand). This converts to 28% of our pupils, across our spectrum of sport codes, representing teams at district level.

Twenty pupils went on to represent provincial teams this year.

Culture (Head of Culture: Mrs Cronje)

Our choir has grown from 20 members last year to 53 members this year, and performed at a number of events, having been invited by other schools to do so.

I have already waxed lyrical about our hosting a successful Zululand Eisteddfod 2024, so I will merely put forward a breakdown of performance awards:

In all, we received:

63 Gold awards; 27 Silver awards; 5 Bronze awards, and we won the Drama and School Dance categories.

Staff acknowledgements

Miss Reddy has been appointed as KZN's National Subject Facilitator for Mathematics. She was also accepted into the ISASA Leadership Development Programme, which is conducted under the auspices of WITS Business School.

Ms Eliot has been appointed as the examiner for the Grade 12 IEB National Senior Certificate IT Paper 1 (Theory).

Miss Visser represented the KZN Country Districts Ladies' Hockey team at the SA Country Districts Tournament.

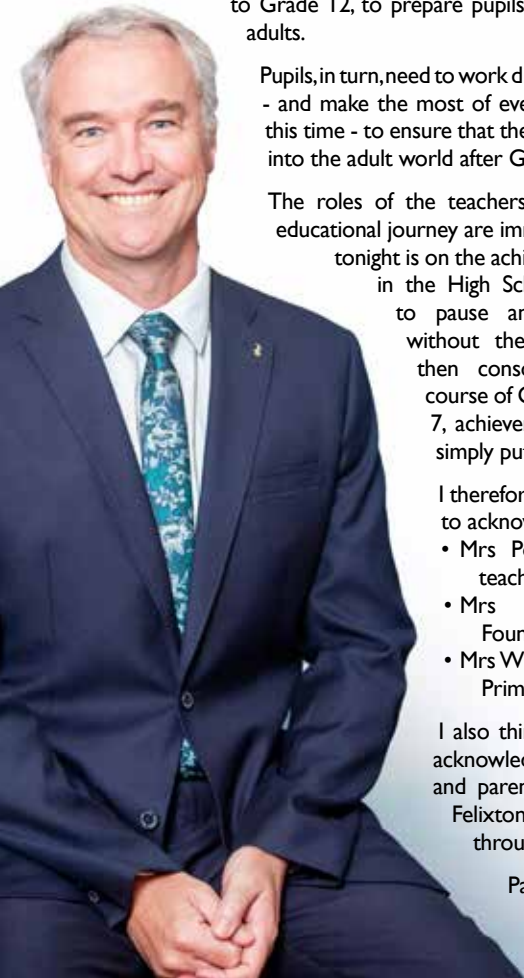
Mr Picton is the Vice President of the Zululand Rugby Sub-union and also serves on the KZN Rugby Council.

Mrs Minnie was recently announced as a Top 10 finalist in the Solidariteit National High school teacher of the year competition.

Her contribution to all things Mathematics and Further Studies Mathematics has been immense, and she will be sorely missed by pupils and staff alike.

As we move towards focusing on the presentation of awards to our pupils, I stand before you tonight, with immense pride and joy, as we gather to celebrate the culmination of another year of hard work, dedication, and exceptional achievement.

Gathered in this venue tonight, is a diverse group of individuals, each with their own unique story, journey, and aspirations. Each pupil here has faced challenges, overcome obstacles, and demonstrated resolute commitment to achieving their goals. It is this spirit of resilience, and determination, that I wish to highlight as the focus of celebration tonight.

The awards received tonight, are not only recognition for:

- Academic excellence,
- Sporting prowess,
- Artistic flair,
- Cultural talent, or
- Commitment to Service and a greater good.

They are symbolic of dedication and hard work that has culminated in achievement.

I take this moment to pause and briefly reflect on what achievement truly means.

Achievement cannot only be about accolades, or trophies. It has to be bigger than that:

- It has to be about the journey that leads us to moments of recognition.
- It has to be about setting a goal, working tirelessly towards it, and ultimately, realising it.
- It has to be about learning lessons along the way.

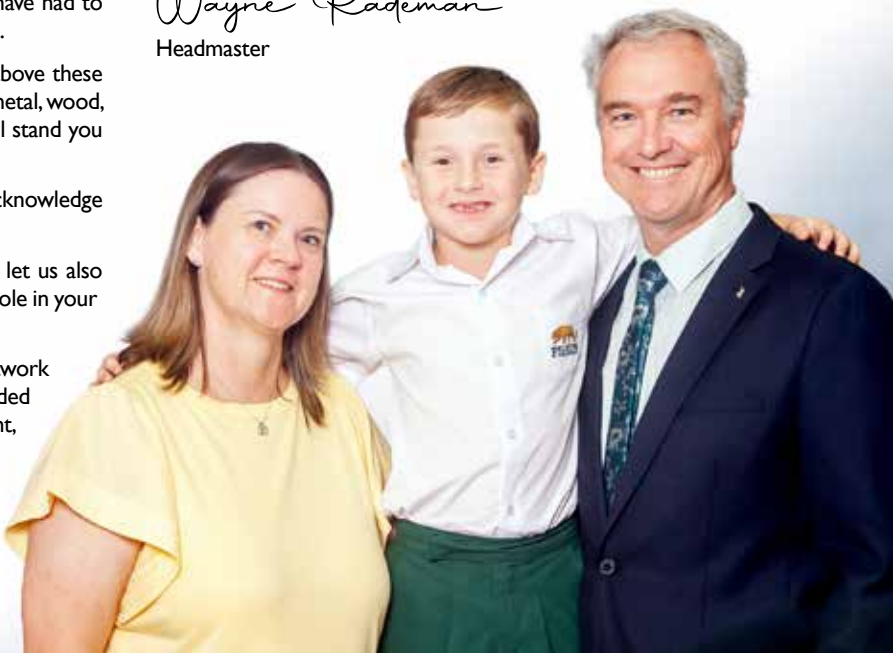

Good evening Members of the Felixton College Family, Mr Rademan, the educators and staff, my fellow Council members and especially our honoured guests, the matriculants of 2024.

As we approach the end of 2024 and reflect on the year, one is filled with a deep sense of pride that 2024 has been another immensely successful year. It is hard to believe that 10 months ago I assumed the position of Chair of Council. As alluded to at our AGM, 2023 was a year that was filled with gratitude and pride with the build of the Junior School.

The process of refining the school's strategy has been ongoing with the strategy planning session that was held in January and is confirming that we are on the right trajectory with choices that are made, which speak to the ethos of our school and its four pillars:

During the course of 2025, these detailed plans will be shared with you.

During 2024, the various individual campuses were upgraded including the Solar Solution commissioned at Roots. We are in the process of

procuring a new bus for the Richards Bay School run.

Over the course of this year, the children have excelled in the classroom, on the sports fields and in our Culture Department. Our children went on to showcase their vast array of talents at the Zululand Eisteddfod which was hosted by the school this year. It is pleasing to note that they have appreciated the privilege that has been afforded to them of attending this amazing school.

These results do not happen by chance. It is the result of the commitment of you the parent and of highly engaged professional educators, dedicated to their cause of nurturing and developing young minds to reach their full potential, not only academically, but to raise good, strong-minded and kind individuals who will make this world a better place.

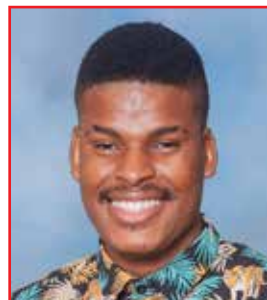

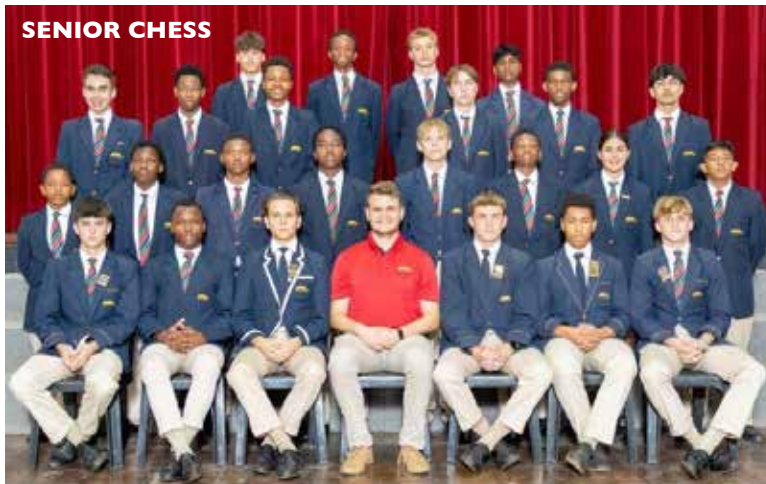
Choir and Marimba

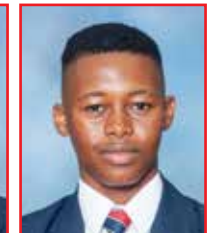

FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL SPORT DESK

Do wins and losses define Felixton College sport's reputation?

Way back in 1731 the young men of All Saint's parish clashed with the St. Peter's parish lads in a town called Derby in the UK. All the men over the age of 18 took part in the 'sport' of trying to force the ball from one parish to the other. Although this sport has changed remarkably from that time, one aspect of that match still remains.

From then on the name 'local Derby' was coined for any heated football match between neighbouring clubs. And in school sport we have a plethora of 'Derbies'.

Yet how crucial are those victories against local rivals in school sports? Well, they've been ingrained in the very essence of school competitions since the early 19th century and therefore take on huge importance in the school calendar. Winning has always been a badge of honour, a sort of unofficial stamp of superiority, albeit a somewhat illogical one. But boy, winning feels so much better than the alternative!

In today's competitive landscape of schools, sports results still carry significant weight. Schools are well aware that to remain appealing to future parents and their offspring, they must be viewed as superior to the neighbouring schools. There's a widespread recognition of the importance of "marketing," these results which sometimes tempts us to think that winning a match implies one school is outshining another and clearly a better institution. But is that really the case?

Reputation matters for any organisation, including schools. A thriving sports programme is a key component of this reputation. However, measuring success solely by goals, tries and runs scored and conceded, is like judging a car by the sound of its hooter- a bit shallow.

Sure, in the heat of the moment, those numbers seem like the Holy Grail and we are always eternally grateful we never went to the losing school. But as a yardstick for quality, they fall short and are as reliable as a chocolate tea-pot. Results are easily swayed by a myriad of temporary factors including luck – which way the ball bounces, who is fit or injured that day, even the weather and the home referee. Shouldn't a school's reputation be based on something more substantial and enduring than a few uncontrollable factors?

Upon deeper reflection, most schools would realise that reputation outweighs results. How many players get to participate in the fixture? How is the game played? Factors like behaviour, skill, creativity, and sportsmanship, along with how staff and parents conduct themselves, are equally if not more important than the final tally. After all, it's the methods used to pursue victory that truly define a school's quality.

A top-notch sports programme instils in its players a drive to excel, a willingness to put in the effort to achieve their best. It fosters commitment, adaptability, and respect for the game, the officials, and the opponents. It encourages a desire to win, tempered with the understanding that victory isn't always guaranteed, and that a late-game goal doesn't diminish the efforts of the losing team or make them inferior.

Coaches and parents play a pivotal role here too, shaping the attitudes and behaviours of the children, for better or for worse. Pressure from adults to win can stifle creativity and enjoyment among players, significantly impacting how outsiders perceive a school. It only takes one out of control parent, coach or player to take the gloss off the finest victory.

Skills, strategies, and effort matter on the field. The absence of these qualities hints at an inadequate sports programme within a school. If teams are well-prepared, enthusiastic, and competitive, it speaks volumes about the school's culture of participation. And if players show up eager to play, demonstrate reliability, put in the work to improve, and maintain good conduct during matches, then an extra goal from the opposing team doesn't make that school a loser.

When assessing the importance of sports results, schools should first consider the impression they want to leave on others. What's the initial

reaction they aim to evoke when others see their name on the fixture card or in the press? On every competitive circuit, there are schools everyone loves to play against, and those dreaded ones where match days are endured rather than enjoyed.

And often, it's not the result of the game that sticks in the memory, but rather the tone of the occasion – the fairness, the fun, and the atmosphere. These are the things remembered long after the final score fades away.

Sure, winning matters, but reputation matters more. Every time.

At Felixton College, we strive to help our young sportsmen and sportswomen have fun playing their sports, be it at practices or fixtures. Evidently it is more fun to win but that cannot be our ultimate goal. In 2023, we won or drew 55% of our matches. In 2024, we won or drew 50% of our matches. However, these stats don't portray what our kids have achieved....

We had more of our hockey teams playing their fixtures on astro-turf this year, this despite us not currently having our own full size astro-turf. The reason for scheduling these fixtures is that we see the value for our sportsmen and sportswomen of playing hockey on astro-turf despite knowing that we will be challenged to come away with wins against these bigger schools whose players practise and play on their astro-turfs week in and week out.

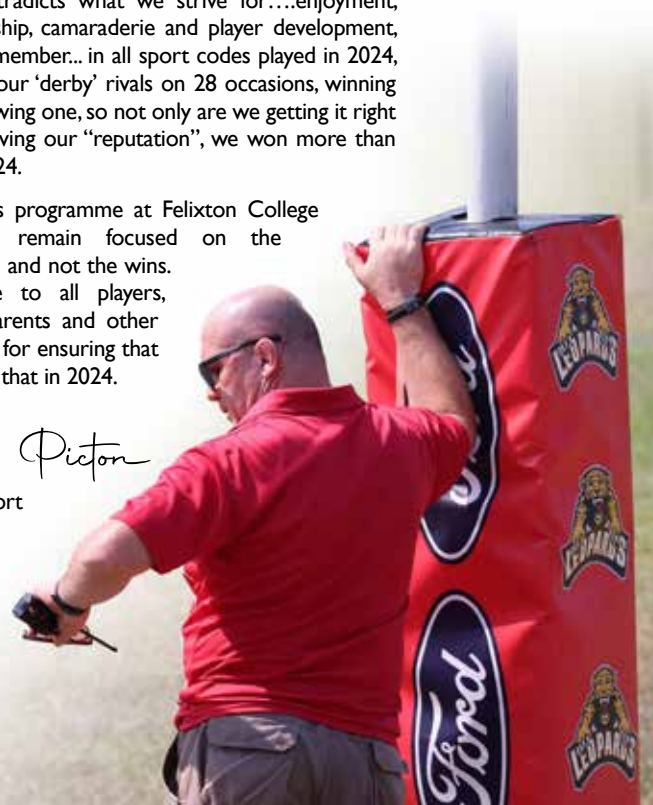
Excluding our Term 4 cricket fixtures, which as I write this, we have not started, we scheduled 13 cricket fixtures in Term 1, of which we only lost one. In all formats of rugby, we won 56% of our fixtures in 2024, not bad when the majority of our opposition schools regularly field more teams and have many more players to choose from. A huge positive for us this year was that we fielded a 2nd XV for the first time since age-banding was introduced 13 years ago. Despite them not managing to pull off a win, these players had the opportunity to develop their skills, to get game time and to have some fun.

Gauging our success by the number of wins and losses contradicts what we strive for....enjoyment, sportsmanship, camaraderie and player development, but just remember... in all sport codes played in 2024, we played our 'derby' rivals on 28 occasions, winning 14 and drawing one, so not only are we getting it right with improving our "reputation", we won more than them in 2024.

Our sports programme at Felixton College needs to remain focused on the 'reputation' and not the wins. Well done to all players, coaches, parents and other supporters for ensuring that we did just that in 2024.

Even though my class didn't collect the most money for the Lapathon - that honour went to the Grade 7 class - we all had a fantastic time.

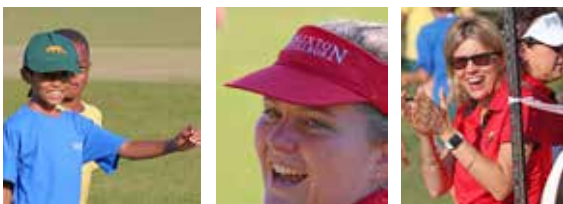
I also want to give a big shout-out to the younger grades, who ran like stars. Thanks to our amazing teachers for organising the event so well and making it a memorable day for all of us.

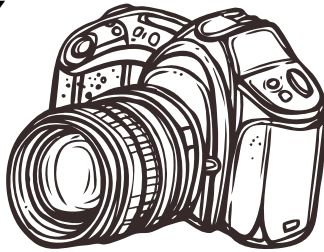

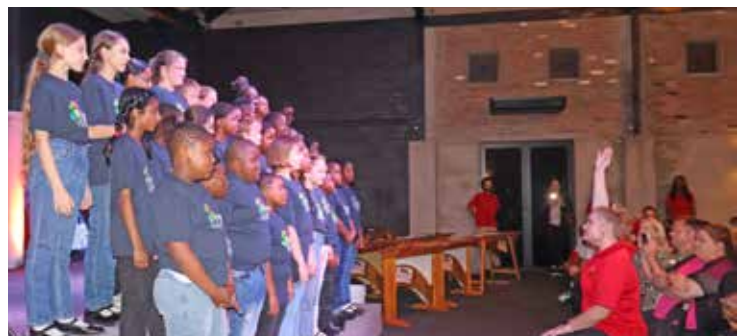

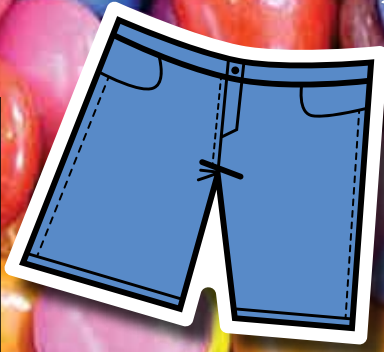
