HEADMASTER'S PRIZE-GIVING SPEECH

Greetings College Council members, Parents, Staff, and Pupils

Prize-Giving is one of those rare moments in the school year when we collectively pause. We step away from the relentless pace of lessons, assessments, sports fixtures, rehearsals, and leadership meetings to reflect - not only on what we have achieved - but on what it truly means to succeed.

Tonight, we honour not only those who receive awards, but also the countless quiet victories that are not always seen, measured, or formally acknowledged.

My focus for this evening is "Resilience and Success". Two concepts that resonate deeply within the walls of any school, because education, by its very nature, is an act of resilience. Every morning that a young person wakes up, puts on their uniform, and steps into a classroom, presents a scenario where they make a choice to keep moving forward, to learn, to grow, and to believe that effort matters.

Resilience is not optional... it is essential. Whether facing academic challenges, personal loss, or the unpredictable waves of life that test our confidence, we have to know... or learn... that resilience is not about pretending everything is perfect. It is about standing tall when life bends you low. It is about finding your footing again after the ground shifts beneath you.

On that note, I quote Kari Kampakis:

Our job is to prepare the child for the path; not the path for the child.

We often imagine resilience as something dramatic: a climber reaching the peak of Everest or an athlete crossing the finish line after an impossible race. But in truth, resilience is far quieter. It lives in the everyday moments: the late-night studying before an examination; the pupil who fails, feels the sting of disappointment, and yet returns to try again; the young person who faces rejection but chooses to keep dreaming.

In a world that often celebrates instant results, resilience teaches patience. It reminds us that the road to genuine success is rarely straight or smooth.

The late Nelson Mandela once said,
Do not judge me by my success. Judge me by how many times I fell down and got back up again.

In our school's journey this year, we have seen resilience expressed in many forms: in the pupils who pushed through the challenge of balancing academics and leadership responsibilities; in the sports teams who lost early games but found their rhythm and spirit as the season went on; and in the teachers who continued to adapt, innovate, and nurture in an ever-changing educational landscape.

Resilience has a way of revealing character. It shows who we are when life removes comfort, control, and certainty.

There is a quote often attributed to Ralph Waldo Emerson:
The reward of a thing well done is to get done it.

In other words, success is not always about the medal at the finish line, but about the person we become in the process of working towards it. The hours of practice, the teamwork, the problem-solving... these shape our character far more than any prize ever could.

Resilience is not about never falling; it's about what happens AFTER the fall.

As educators and parents, our greatest task is not only to prepare our young people for success, but to equip them to handle failure - to understand that stumbling is not a sign of weakness, but a step on the path to strength.

To our Grade 12s,

This is your final Prize-giving at Felixton College, and ALMOST the beginning of a new chapter in your lives. You are stepping into a world filled with uncertainty, but also with possibility.

There will be times in the years ahead when you feel lost or overwhelmed. In those moments, remember what you learned here - not just in the classroom, but in the countless experiences (GOOD AND BAD) that shaped your spirit.

Remember the friends who stood beside you; your teachers and parents who believed in you; the lessons that taught you to think critically, to act with empathy, and to dream boldly.

Carry those lessons forward. Carry the resilience you've built - the ability to troubleshoot and find solutions, to create meaning out of chaos. And above all, maintain your integrity.

The world needs intelligent minds; it also needs kind hearts.

When you leave this hall tonight, you are not just leaving a school; you are carrying its spirit with you - the spirit of resilience, compassion, and purpose.

To our pupils in Grades 8 to 11, your journey is still unfolding. You are in the process of discovering who you are and what you can achieve. Learn from your mistakes. Ask for help when you need it. Your future success will NOT depend on being perfect... it will depend on your ability to adapt, and to stay true to your values.

To our parents and teachers, tonight, is as much your celebration, as it is the pupils'. You are the anchors behind their achievements, the voices of encouragement, and the examples of perseverance.

Parents, thank you for your sacrifices; for early mornings and late nights, and endless support. For believing in your children even when they doubted themselves. For teaching them that love and discipline are two sides of the same coin.

Teachers, thank you for your tireless dedication, your patience, your creativity, and your compassion.

You are the builders of resilience. Every lesson, every correction, every act of kindness has shaped these young people into who they are becoming.

As Henry Adams once said,
A teacher affects eternity; they can never tell where their influence stops.

Your influence is evident tonight - in every award received, every smile of pride, and every pupil who has grown in confidence and courage.

Surface - Dry Innovation

A new category of artificial turf for field hockey and other sports that are designed to be played without water, eliminating the need for expensive and water-intensive irrigation systems.

Key innovations include specialised yarn technologies and backing systems that reduce surface friction, provide consistent ball roll, and maintain player grip, all while saving water and meeting the International Hockey Federation's (FIH) standards. Too legit... too legit to quit!*

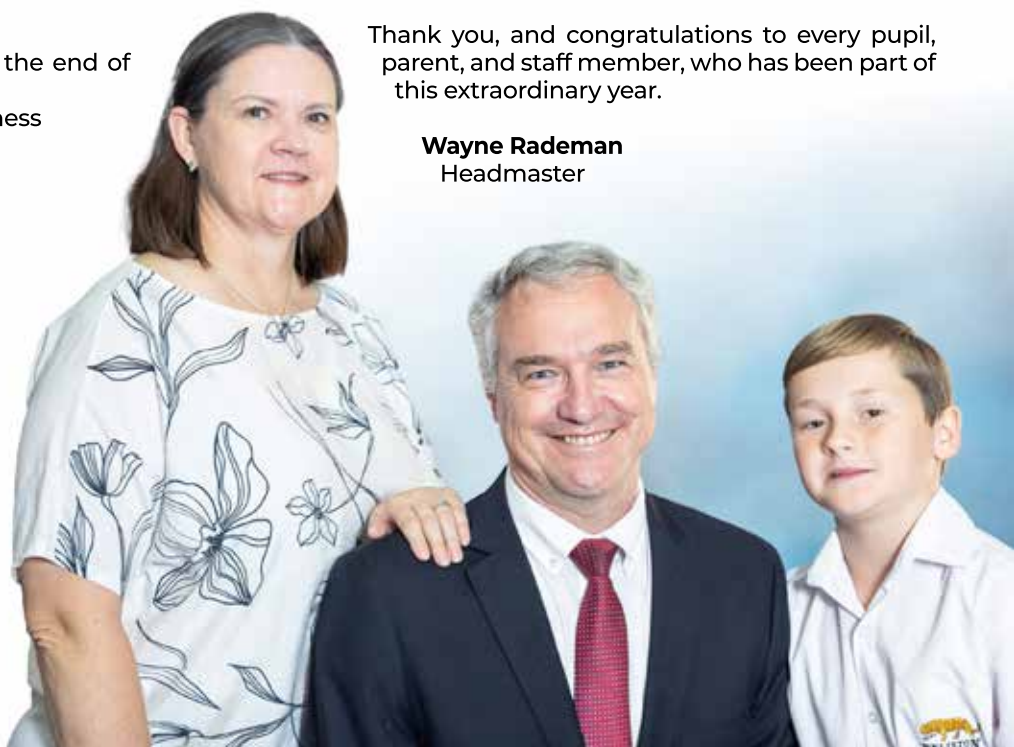

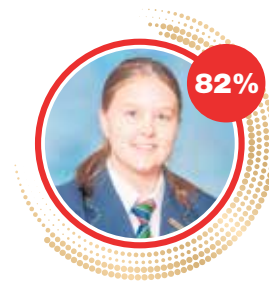

achieved remarkable results. Notably, Lwandile Zulu claimed first place across multiple categories against tough competition from schools in the region. We wish him the best as he advances to the provincial round in December. At the Con Spirito competitions, our speakers earned outstanding grades, from A+ to A+++ , with particular recognition for our Best House Play Director, Luyanda Ndawonde, who also won the Monologue category at both Con Spirito and the Regional Public Speaking competition hosted by the Empangeni Debating League.

The Con Spirito competitions again saw strong participation from our pupils, producing excellent results. We are especially proud of our six national winners in Public Speaking, Instrumental, and Art categories. A standout achievement came from Alexa Wood, who entered ten items- eight of which qualified for the National Forte round. She went on to win two categories at this prestigious level.

Drama remains a flourishing part of our cultural life. This year's House Plays provided a wonderful evening of laughter, talent, and energy, showcasing both first-time performers and experienced actors. Congratulations to Ulwazi Mzulwini, awarded Best Actress, and to Vulcan House for winning Best Performed Play.

Our Chess Club also made its mark, with pupils competing in regional tournaments. We are especially proud of Isabelle Wilson, who represented the school in multiple King Cetshwayo matches and held her own against tough competitors.

Our ever-developing Cultural Clubs programme continues to inspire creativity and curiosity. Highlights of the year included Mr Mitchley teaching pupils welding and biltong-making, the Science Club constructing holographic projectors and potato launchers, the Fiction Club under Mrs Minnie nurturing budding storytellers, and the DIY Club experimenting with tote-bag design and clay work.

At Felixton College, culture never stands still. We are always dreaming up new ideas to inspire creativity and foster new initiatives. Auditions for our 2026 musical, La Famiglia, have already produced a talented cast and ensemble. Rehearsals are under way, and we look forward to bringing sparkle, song, and jazz to the stage in 2026.

In closing, I would like to thank our parents and staff for their unwavering support of our cultural endeavours this year. To our pupils - well done on your creativity, commitment, and remarkable achievements. You have once again shown that culture truly is the heartbeat of Felixton College.

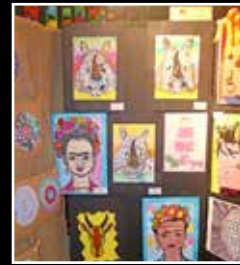

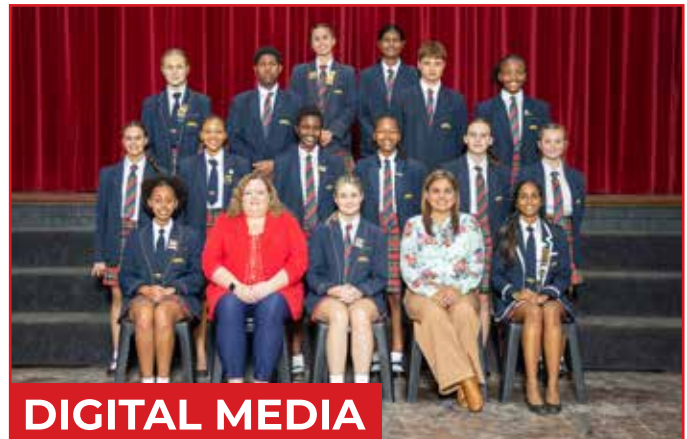

HEADBOY'S PRIZE-GIVING SPEECH

From Cub to Leopard

On the 29th of January 2022, a cub arrived at Felixton College. It was a rainy Friday. This cub was small, nervous, carrying a bag far too big, filled with stationary he would never need in his lifetime. On that very first day, the cub stumbled—the school bus left him behind. He stood in the rain, unsure, vulnerable.

But then, a leopard of the forest came to his rescue, drove him all the way to his house- in that exact moment I saw the kind of family I was welcomed to, a family made of teachers who protect, guide, and nurture. A family called Felixton College

Good evening, Mr Rademan, Felixton College staff, Felixton College chairperson Mrs Reddy, parents, and my fellow Felixtonians.

This is a story of an individual, a genius, playboy, billionaire, philanthropist. Who entered the gates of Felixton a fateful day. An individual without exposure, an individual who did not know his full potential. That weekend he decided to research what it meant to be a leopard.

You've shaped me into the individual I am today. To my sisters, Siwa and Sesi - thank you. You've stolen my stationery, annoyed me endlessly, but you've also been there to lift me up when I was down.

Above all, I want to thank uMvelinqangi, the Lord who has carried me this far. Without Him, I don't know where I would be.

But family doesn't only live at home. Felixton has been my second family. I've been surrounded by other cubs on their own journeys, and it has been nothing short of amazing.

And of course, I cannot stand here without mentioning my executive

team. From the very beginning, you've been my pride, my family within my family. Leadership is never a one-man journey, and you've proven that again and again that we have each others backs.

I also want to take a moment to thank Alexa, our Head girl and my friend. Alexa, you've made this journey not just meaningful, but memorable. You've shown me that leadership can be fun - from our last-minute Life Science cramming sessions to our endless complaining about subjects we somehow still managed to get as for. You've been a partner, a motivator, and a friend, and I couldn't have asked for anyone better to share this chapter of leadership with.

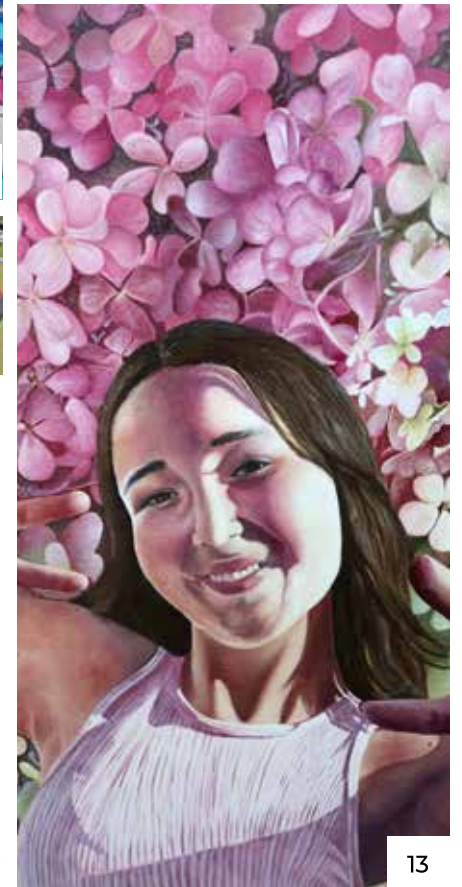

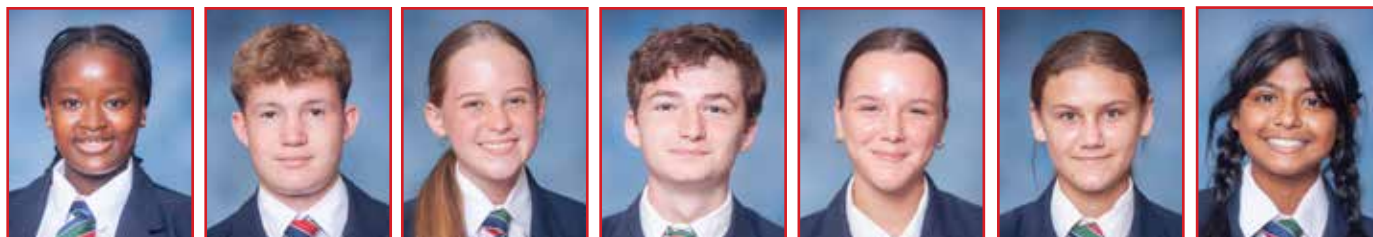

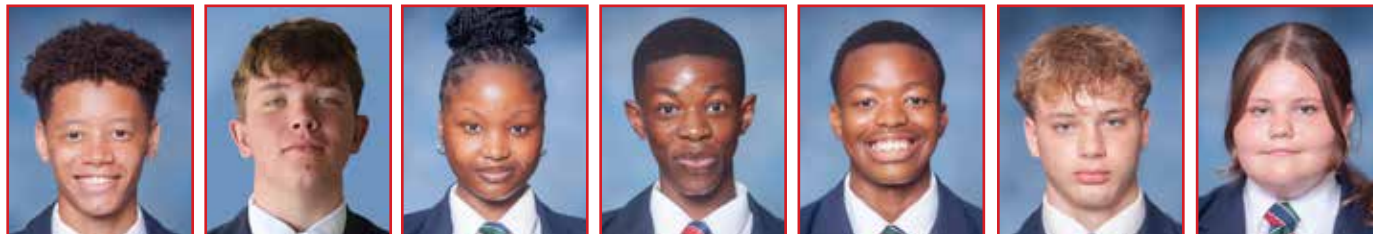
BERG HIKE
